Pineapple Tomatoes (Heirloom)

Growth Habit: Indeterminate, with long vines that continue to grow and produce fruit until frost. These large plants can reach heights of 6 to 8 feet tall and require vertical support, such as stakes or cages, to keep their heavy fruits off the ground.

Best Uses: Fresh eating, slicing, sandwiches, and salads. Known for their sweet, almost tropical flavor with a citrus-like tang, these tomatoes are a favorite for their smooth, rich flesh and low seed count. They are also a visually stunning addition to any garden with their yellow and red coloring.

Growing Information:

- Full sun (at least 6 hours of direct sunlight)
- Well-draining, fertile soil with a pH of 6.0 to 6.8
- Start seeds indoors 4 to 6 weeks before the last frost
- Transplant seedlings outdoors after hardening off
- Space plants 24 to 36 inches apart

Maintenance Information:

- Water consistently, providing 1 to 2 inches of water per week
