

Stupice Tomatoes (Heirloom)

Growth Habit: Indeterminate, with vines that continue to grow and produce fruit until frost. These compact plants reach around 4 feet tall and have a vining growth habit, requiring support from stakes, cages, or trellises.

Best Uses: Early season tomatoes, fresh eating, and salads. Known for their extremely early maturity (50 days from transplant) and cold-tolerance, these tomatoes provide an early harvest of flavorful, red fruit that are around 2½-inch by 2-inch in diameter.

Growing Information:

- Full sun (at least 6 hours of direct sunlight)
- Well-draining, fertile soil with a pH of 6.0 to 6.8
- Start seeds indoors 6 to 8 weeks before the last frost
- Transplant seedlings outdoors after hardening off
- Space plants 18 to 24 inches apart

Maintenance Information:

- Water consistently, providing 1 to 2 inches of water per week
- Fertilize with a balanced tomato fertilizer every 3 to 4 weeks
- Prune suckers and lower leaves to encourage fruit production and maintain plant structure

Pest Management:

- Monitor for common tomato pests like aphids, whiteflies, and spider mites
- Watch for signs of fungal diseases like early blight and late blight, and remove infected leaves promptly

Companion Plants:

- Good companion plants for Stupice tomatoes include basil, marigolds, and nasturtiums, which help repel pests and promote beneficial insects.
- Avoid planting tomatoes near fennel, potatoes, or other members of the nightshade family to prevent disease and pests from spreading.
